### Spotlight On: Theresa Brown

Theresa was born and raised in Harlem, New York. She began school at the tender age of four years old. At the age of seven, her mother taught her how to sew beginning with making clothes for baby dolls. Some of the clothes were distributed by missionaries to children.

She earned a Bachelor in Science Degree from Herbert H. Lehman College which is located in the Bronx. Her

degree is a discipline in Dietetic, Food and Nutrition.

After her divorce, Theresa moved to Shaker Heights, Ohio in order to be near her brother and his family who lives in Shaker Heights.

In 2003, Theresa earned an Associate Degree in Nursing from Cuyahoga Community College (CCC) East.

Theresa learned to quilt at "Sew Creative Quilt Shop" (now closed) which was located in Chillicothe, Ohio. They had weekend quilt classes. She also has attended Quilt Classes by Sew De juVu Quilt Shop. She also gets inspiration from Facebook, You Tube, Internet, Magazines and Books. Theresa is very generous with her projects. She gives them to friends, co-workers, family etc. They have been the lucky recipients of her quilts, wall hangings, place mats, purses and overnight bags.

Theresa quilts as well as piece. She finds quilting to

be very relaxing, exciting and therapeutic. One of her favorite projects is working with "hexies". She finds it a joy to see the hexies come together, and build a piece of quilting art. One of her daughters is an accomplished quilter who also pieces her quilts.

Quilting is not her only passion. Theresa is a gifted painter who paints on canvas. You should ask her to show you some of her beautiful paintings.

Theresa also meets on Thursdays (via zoom) with single mothers. She teaches and helps them. She has been doing this for fifteen years as one of the programs sponsored by Parkside Church in Bainbridge, Ohio. This program consists of Bible Study, transportation when meeting at the Church or John Hay High School, social services, and day care. The single moms are also taught how to make jewelry which they can give as gifts or save as heirlooms. Theresa also volunteers at Cain Park (located in Cleveland Heights) on Thursday Nights in the Summer.

One day at the IX Center Sewing Expo, Theresa met Gloria Kellon who was president of the guild at this time. Gloria invited her to visit the guild where she was teaching Raggedy Ann and Andy Rag Dolls. Theresa came to the guild, was impressed and joined. She still has some unfinished rag dolls.

Another talent Gregory has is baking. He loves to bake.


Words cannot describe his baking skills. The Guild can attest to this fact because he has brought samples to our meetings and quilt show.

### NIADA ACADEMY LIVE DOLLMAKING SCHOOL JULY 16-18, 2023

National Institute of America Doll Artists (NIADA) held their annual workshop in North Carolina (NC) this year. Four members from our guild attended. They were: Barbara Townsend, Doressa Carlton, Terra Turner and Myrya Johnson. The workshops were held in Spencer, NC at the First Community Center, the airport is in Charlotte, NC and the hotel is located in Salisbury, NC.

Up the street from the Community Center is the "NC Museum of Dollhouses, Model Trains, Dolls, Toys & Miniatures". The museum is housed in a 4,000 ft building. Everyone went to the museum after classes on Monday, July 17<sup>th</sup>. It is overwhelming. I have never seen so many dolls etc. in my life housed into one building! It is a "Must See" whenever one is in this part of NC.

The address of the museum is: 108 Fourth Street, Spencer, NC.

The NIADA was founded in 1963; therefore, this is their 60<sup>th</sup> Year. We were given NIADA Ballpoint pens with a fake diamond on top as a gift to commemorate this milestone.

However, due to lack of sufficient enrolees this will be NIADA's last live workshops in America. The workshops will be via virtual in America, and the live workshops will be overseas. They are planning their 2025 conference in Warsaw, Poland. NIADA's Academy has many courses that can be obtained through their website: NIADA.org/Academy. I have taken courses from their website, and they were very clear with lots of information. There is a workbook in each course that can be downloaded for future reference

This year, we lost an Icon/Pioneer in the Dollmaking World: Elinor Peace Bailey. I can't remember our having a Quilt Show; whereby, at least one of her dolls were exhibited. Elinor was very relentless in establishing dollmaking clubs, and making patterns that were easy to follow. I was fortunate to have her as a quest one week end at my house. She was teaching a dollmaking class at Pins and Needles that was in Middleburg Heights at that time.

I hate to start naming the dollmakers that we have lost (I might leave out a name). As I was writing this article, I thought about a County Song written and sung by the late George Jones. The name of the song is "Who's Going to Fill Their Shoes?" It goes like this:

"...Who's gonna fill their shoes?

Who's gonna stand that tall?

Lord, I wonder who's gonna fill their shoes?

Yes, I wonder who's gonna fill their shoes?"

The above is just a part of the song.

For Information: NIADA is the brand of their organization, however their mission today is more international – so they are adding "An International Artist Organization" to their title.


